To help us achieve our aims, within our philosophy or partnership with parents, we ask you to:

- ensure your child is punctual and attends school regularly
- keep us fully informed of any changes of circumstances so we can be responsive to your child's needs
- attend our events in school e.g. Reading and Writing workshop , ICT workshops Curriculum evenings, Open Days, Annual performance, Special Assemblies, etc
- Support and volunteer on trips
- Encourage and support your child's learning in school and through our homework programme and other activities we may ask them to do at home
- Ensure your child takes care of school property.

#### <u>First Aid</u>

As in all schools, children can sustain minor injuries while they are at school. These usually happen during playtimes. If your child has an accident whilst at school it will be recorded in our accident book and reported to the class teacher. If children receive First Aid they will receive a letter informing you of the treatment administered. If the injury is more serious we will contact you by telephone. The majority of our school staff has attended recent First Aid courses which mean that they are confident in dealing with accidents. Lists of First Aided trained staff is displayed around the school.

#### <u>Medicines</u>

Occasionally when a child is recovering from an illness they may be well enough to return to school although they are finishing a course of prescribed medicine. If this is the case we ask for a form to be completed at the school office to enable a member of staff to dispense the medicine. We are unable to dispense non-prescription drugs of any kind.

#### Children with Asthma

If your child has asthma please could you ensure that the class teacher has working inhalers in school at all times. They will be stored as close to the children as possible so that they can use them on a regular basis or as their need demands.

#### Special Educational Needs

Our Special Educational Needs policy is based on early recognition followed by regular monitoring and assessment of your child's needs. An individual education plan (IEP) will be written which will set up a specific programme of support for your child. Most concerns are addressed by school based provision which generally involves your child receiving additional support either from the class teacher or teaching assistant. This may be individually or in small groups. If our support in school identifies that the child's special need is more serious, then they move to the School Action Plus stage in the Code which may include advice, guidance and assessment of other out of school specialist agencies.

A child with serious Special Educational Needs or awarded as statement, the school is unable admit to them, or is at a stage the school can request to the parents to move their son/daughter in a state school where resources are available.

Parents are fully informed at every stage of meeting your child's special educational needs. Parents are invited in on a termly basis to discuss IEP's. Every child at Al-Falah is valued and given equality of opportunity in all areas of school life whatever their class, culture, race, belief, gender, ability or disability.

#### Homework Policy

At Al-Falah we see homework as an integral part of learning, and regular parental involvement is vital for this learning to be effective. Homework can encourage a child to become more responsible for their own learning and it can also enhance a parents knowledge of what is expected of their academic performance.

The guidance for the amount of homework to be sent home has been laid down by the Government.

They are as follows; *Key Stage 1* – 1 hour per week *Key Stage 2* – 1 hour and 30 minutes per week

Literacy and Numeracy homework is sent home every week, however subject specific work may be included when appropriate. The children will be required to learn sounds, spellings, number bonds and timetables at home.

At Al-Falah we feel that the most valuable work you can do at home with your child is to read and share books with your child. Children take home books every day and in addition to this they can borrow books regularly from the school library on our site.

#### Absence and Lateness

At Al-Falah we work hard to minimise our rates of authorised and unauthorised absences. If a child is absent from school it is helpful for the parent to contact the school and inform us. This can be done by telephone, text message, e-mail or letter. When child return to the school after absence he/she has to bring a letter from the parents explaining reason for the absence. Every Friday the school administration officer checks the registers and follows up any children who are late or absent without reasons, with a letter. If a child's attendance is giving cause of concern then school will call parents to meet with the head teacher and to resolve the problem. It is parents' responsibility to bring and take their children every day and on time.

#### <u>Punctuality</u>

A smooth and punctual start to the day is very important for children. The school doors are opened at 8.00am and children line up in the playground for daily whole school assembly. All teachers prepare early morning work for the first ten minutes where the children practise essential skills or reinforce work from the previous day. If a child arrives at school after 8:15 they must report to the school office where they are signed in the late book.

#### <u>Holidays</u>

The school absence policy states that 'no family holidays to be taken during term time as this is disruptive to the child and does affect their progress.' If for exceptional reasons a holiday has to be taken during term time then parents are asked to complete a Holiday Request Form which will be given to the head teacher for approval.

#### UNIFORM

#### For Boys:

- Royal/light blue jumper
- Thobe/jubba of any colour, preferably white
- Plain black shoes (no trainers)
- Plain white hat

#### For girls:

- Royal/light blue jumper or cardigan
- Black Abaya
- Plain black shoes (no trainers)
- Plain white scarf





Please note that 'black shoes' are part of the uniform. If your child is not wearing black shoes they are not conforming to the uniform code and will be sent home.

#### P.E Kit:

For boys: the children wear a white T-Shirt with jogging bottom and black trainers. For girls: the children wear a white long T- Shirt with jogging bottom and black trainers.

#### For health and safety reasons children are not allowed to wear jewellery at Al -Falah.

#### <u>School Timing</u>

The playground gates are opened at **8:00 am** every day. Children arriving before this time must wait in orderly fashion by the gate.

The playground gate is closed at 8:15am. Any child arriving after this time is late.

Timing:

Monday to Thursday: 8:00 am to 3:45 pm

Friday (only): 8:00 am to 11:45 pm

#### Arrival and Registration:

- All children should be ready to come into school at 8.00 a.m. and line up in the play ground for Assembly every morning. The register is taken twice a day at 8.15am and 12:.20pm. A day counts as 2 attendances.
- If a child arrives after the registration period, he / she will be marked in as Late and the parent or the carer has to sign in the book in office stating reasons for the lateness. The afternoon register is taken at 12:20p.m.
- If a child arrives after 8:20am without a valid reason , they will receive a mark (P.U.) Present Unauthorised that shows them to be on site, but this will **not** count as a present mark and it will mean they have an unauthorized absence. This may mean that you could face the possibility of a Penalty Notice if the problem persists.
- It is essential that children arriving and leaving school with a parent / guardian outside the normal hours are signed in or out from the office. The signing in / out register in the office is used in the case of an emergency or a fire drill.

#### <u>Lateness:</u>

Pupils who arrive after the registration time then the parents or the carers have to go to the school office to sign in and give a reason for their lateness. Any unjustifiable reason for absence will be marked as unauthorised. It is vital that pupils sign in at the office to ensure that appropriate health and safety regulations are followed and that all pupils are accounted for.

Children who are persistently late miss a significant amount of learning, often the most important aspect, as the beginning of the day is where the teacher explains the learning and what each child is expected to achieve.

#### <u>Lunchtimes</u>

At lunchtimes our children are supervised and cared for by our afternoon teachers. Children are able to choose between having a school lunch and bringing in a packed lunch from home. This choice can be made on a daily basis as lunches are ordered each morning. You can pay for lunches daily or weekly and we ask that all money is sent in a named purse or envelope. If your child would like to bring a packed lunch we respectively ask that they do not contain sweets or fizzy drinks.

#### <u>Behaviour</u>

At Al-Falah we are very proud of the behaviour of our children. Our aim is to encourage the children to develop their own self-discipline. We do this by creating and maintaining a positive atmosphere where children can make appropriate choices and be successful. We believe in a fair and consistent approach which recognises and celebrates good behaviour whilst calmly managing inappropriate behaviour. We have a system of positive reinforcement for the children who abide by the rules which includes 'Golden Time' team points, stickers, words of praise; class rewards students of the month and certificates in Assembly!

If your child does exhibit inappropriate behaviour we operate a yellow and red card system. If a child receives three yellow cards they are given a red card and asked to report to one of the Class teachers to discuss their behaviour. If they receive three red cards in the course of a term they are sent to the head teacher who may invite parents in to discuss the behaviour of the child.

#### School Council

At Al-Falah we have a well established and popular school council. The children from each class select two children to represent their views and concerns. Their term of office is for one school term and they meet every month. The councillors discuss different issues and take minutes of the meeting.

#### Child Protection

We take child protection very seriously at Al-Falah. Children on occasions disclose information about events in their lives and if the nature of the disclosure warrants it, the head teacher has a legal obligation to inform the Child Protection team within the Social Services. It is also a legal requirement that the school makes this contact prior to the parents being involved.

#### Admissions Policy

Al-Falah is an independent school. We do not have any catchment area but you must refer to the admission criteria which are set out at the end of this section.

To apply for a place for your child an admission form and information leaflet are enclosed in this prospectus. To make an appointment to look around the school please telephone the school office,

We accept applications for children after their fifth birthday. When the number of applications exceeds the number of places available the following criteria apply, in order of priority:

- 1. Children who are of compulsory school age.
- 2. Children who participate in our admission test and are accepted by their year group teacher.
- 3. Children of compulsory school age who have brothers and sisters attending the school.
- 4. Children whose parents have any other appropriate reason for their preference.

#### **Complaints Procedure**

Everyone at Al-Falah aims to ensure that your child's time with us is successful and rewarding. If however you are dissatisfied with an aspect of the school in the first instance please talk to your child's class teacher or the head teacher who is available most of the time.

A parent who still has concerns should contact the Chair of Governors via the school office. If however it has not been possible to settle a parent's concerns a formal complaint can be made and a policy outlining the arrangements is available from the school office.

#### Charging of School Activities

All schools are legally bound to have a charging policy and at Al-Falah parents will be notified of proposed visits and invited to contribute voluntarily towards the cost. No child will be excluded from activities on the grounds that their parents are unable or unwilling to contribute. However, if we receive insufficient voluntary contributions then the visit may not take place. Full details of the charging policy are available from the school office.

#### The Curriculum

#### Ofsted says

"'Staff are good role models in the way they speak to and care for pupils. Several pupils told inspectors that the 'school is like one giant family'. Parents and carers are overwhelmingly positive about the level of support and guidance that their children receive.'' Ofsted 2018.

At Al-Falah we deliver a broad and balanced curriculum through the delivery of National Curriculum and the Islamic studies. Each subject area is well planned and monitored to ensure progression and continuity of learning for all pupils across the school. How and what your child is taught will be communicated to you by class teachers in a meeting at the beginning and at the end of the school year and via termly curriculum overview. Each area of the curriculum has a policy document and these are available to all parents on request.

Children's education is divided up into the following five stages:

Key Stage One from 5-7 Years Key Stage Two from 7-11 Years

The teaching and learning for the other Key Stages consists of 11 subjects which make up the National Curriculum. These are:

English , Mathematics, Science, Information and Communication Technology (ICT) , Design & Technology, History , Geography , Art , Physical Education MFL – Arabic and Islamic Studies contain including (PHSE)

#### And

Islamic studies consist of Reading and reciting Quran with Tajweed, Akhlaq and Aqa'id (PHSE) and memorising Quran. We believe Al-Falah is one of the best schools in London where children receive best teaching in both Islamic Curriculum and National Curriculum.

What parents say about Al-Falah:

Literacy: At Al-Falah we believe that literacy is the door through which children access all other areas of the curriculum. We use the National Literacy Strategy Framework for the teaching of literacy (including Collins Literacy schemes) and this gives detailed aims for teaching reading and writing. Our aim is to provide our children with the skills needed to be able to communicate and convey meaning clearly and accurately, through the spoken word and in written form. We wish them to be able to speak with fluency, understanding and expression. They are taught to develop a clear, legible style of handwriting and to write well in a range of styles with a high level of spelling, grammar and punctuation. We also encourage our children to take an interest in and to appreciate literacy in all its forms for future learning and pleasure.

#### <u>Mathematics</u>

At Al-Falah we believe that numeracy is an essential life skill and also a very exciting subject if taught in the right way. We work hard to develop children's confidence and competence with numbers and measures. Children are taught mental computational methods from the early years and we place a big emphasis on the teaching and learning of number bonds and timetables.

At Al-Falah we use the national Numeracy Strategy Framework for teaching mathematics (including Collins Maths schemes) as it offers children a secure foundation in numeracy. The framework gives detailed aims for teaching maths, which is taught during a daily maths lesson for all pupils.

#### Islamic Studies:

At Al-Falah the children learn Islamic studies at the afternoon sessions. Every class has their own Islamic Studies teacher. Children learn reciting Quran with tajweed. Our

curriculum is based on the IOS syllabus that contains Fiqh, Akhlaq, (PHSE) Aqa'id and Tareekh (history). The children who like to memorise the Quran, they attend in separate Hifz class. The Arabic language is taught as a modern foreign language in morning sessions.

#### <u>Science</u>

The world of science holds a great fascination for children and it is a much loved subject at Al-Falah. Our children accumulate scientific knowledge about plants, animals, materials and forces, sound, light and space. They also learn how to design their own investigations and interpret their findings in order to draw conclusions.

#### <u> ICT</u>

ICT is an essential and continually developing part of our curriculum. We believe strongly that for children to function in the wider world they need to be confident and able to use the most up to date technological devices. Each classroom has a laptop for teacher connected with projector to use ICT in their lesson as learning tools. We have a computer suit where children learn and develop their ICT skills as a whole. Apart from the above subjects we also teach PE, Geography and History in morning sessions.

#### Personal Social and Health Education

At Al-Falah we place high value on this aspect of a child's education. We teach our children to have high self esteem and confidence and instil in them that getting things wrong is part of the learning process. In PSHE children learn about life skills and about their own rights, duties and responsibilities but also about the rights and responsibilities of others. Through our PSHE teaching we help them to respect and value the richness and diversity of our society and give them guidance on how to be a good citizen in modern society. We extended PHSE in Islamic studies as well.

#### <u>Assessment</u>

At Al-Falah we strive to teach all children according to their individual needs and ability and we use a thorough assessment process to help us achieve this goal. The children are regularly assessed by the teachers in all areas of the curriculum and this information is used to monitor progress, provide additional help if needed, provide more challenge if a child is identified as gifted and talented and to identify the next learning step. Al-Falah has a rigorous assessment system in place that was praised in the last OSFSTED. More detailed information on our assessment procedures can be found in the policy which is available to all parents.

#### <u>Assembly</u>

Every Friday morning we have an assembly to celebrate all of the good things which have happened throughout the week. The head teacher talks on (PHSCE) different topics and children are given opportunity to reflect their learning of the week. The Whole school also participate in reciting Quran and Nasheed.

## Last five years result for SATs

Over the previous years, Al-Falah Primary School has achieved excellent SATs results. The young boys and girls in Year 6 work very hard to achieve their potential.

In year 2016, the national average SATs result was 53% and Al Falah's average SATs result was 96%.

In year 2017, the national average SATs result was 61% and Al Falah's average SATs result was 90%.

In year 2018, the national average SATs result was 76% and Al Falah's average SATs result was 95%.

Al-Falah students have managed to achieve its customary outstanding SATs result in 2019 too.
